### Prescription help focus of Capitol news conference

Oklahomans needing free or reduced-cost medications got oneon-one assistance on March 28 when the "Help is Here Express" bus made a stop at the State Capitol.

Representatives from several OKACAA member agencies attended a news conference held in conjunction with the bus stop at the State Capitol.

The bus is a traveling education center making stops throughout the country to raise awareness about how to take advantage of the Partnership for Prescription Assistance program.

The RX for Oklahoma increases access to prescription drugs for low-income Oklahomans through a partnership with pharmaceutical companies that offer free and discounted prices on prescription drugs.

Community action agencies and area agencies on aging are providing the program statewide.

#### Radio play raises funds for Deep Fork Community Action

Deep Fork Community Action Foundation is continuing to raise funds to provide emergency assistance in its four county service area with theatrical presentations.

Jeff Schuman, executive director, and Sherry West, social services director, recruited a diverse group of local residents to join the Neighbors-Without-Shame-Players to present "A Night at WSOS" in Okmulgee on March 25.

The event raised about \$1,200. It was the 12th production for Deep Fork, according to Schuman. Most of the other plays have been murder mysteries.

Written by Schuman, the dinner theatre presentation was a humorous behind-the-scenes look at a radio station in the 1930s doing a live broadcast of a play called "The Legend of Tex Arcana."

The three act play revolved around the tall tale being told by a crotchety old grandfather to his pesky grandchildren. High school drama teacher Craig Brydges portrayed the grandfather. City council member Rae Ann Wilson and KOKL radio station manager Randy Belford were the grandkids.

Grandpa was constantly interrupted by grandma who during the week is election board secretary Ann Powders.

Schuman, decked out in a tux, portrayed the station announcer who would hang a silver star on the microphone before delivering his lines.

Veteran ensemble member Scott Martin was the foley man (sound guy) who provided about 100 sound effects. Martin, a regular volunteer at Deep Fork, said he had done four previous productions for the agency.

Okmulgee Daily Times reporter Cheryl Schuman was the play director who was constantly battling "talent" over the size of their dressing rooms and paychecks and berating the script writer, portrayed by sports editor Larry Owen, over the trash he was writing.

A pair of leggy "Fleckler's Cheesettes" -- Kristi Powders and Christi Cranton -- sang jingles for wacky commercials and danced across the stage with "Thunderous Applause" signs at the beginning and end of each act. William Barnett was the commercial announcer.

The Okmulgee Elks Lodge provided the room for the play and the meal. Local businesses provided door prizes.

Deep Fork's next production was a murder mystery dinner theatre presentation of "Final Cut." It was presented by the Eufaula High School Drama Club on April 8 to support Deep Fork's efforts in McIntosh County.
