What Is Community Action?

Community Action Agencies are locally controlled non-profit organizations that work to improve the lives of low-income individuals by creating opportunities for increased self-sufficiency and greater participation in the community. In Oklahoma, Community Action Agencies serve all 77 counties.

One of the strengths of Community Action is its local control and local decision-making. A tripartite board of directors governs each Community Action Agency. Each board has at least one-third of its membership representing low-income residents, one-third local elected officials or their designees, and the remainder representing local business, civic organizations, faith-based group, and similar interests in the community. This unique board structure allows each local Community Action Agency to determine the most effective programs based on the needs of communities in its service area.

Each Community Action Agency operates a wide variety of programs that are based upon the needs of each local community which are identified through a needs assessment. Different communities have different needs. The local Community Action Agency responds to the specific needs of each community.

Community Action Agencies provide a broad range of programs. They weatherize homes to reduce a family's energy costs while helping them stay warm in the winter. They provide early child-hood programs to help prepare youngsters to succeed in school. They build affordable houses so families can have a home of their own. They help families complete and file their federal and state tax returns free. They provide opportunities for senior citizens to stay active in their communities through volunteer programs. They provide transit programs to get families to medical appointments and workers to jobs. They help the elderly maintain their health through nutrition programs. They help our most vulnerable households avoid loss of essential services through utility payment assistance. They help finance job training programs.

Community Action Agencies receive funding from federal and state appropriations as well as private funding sources. The Federal Community Services Block Grant provides core support. It provides administrative and program support to enable Community Action Agencies to partner with other community organizations to provide needed services.

Community Action Agencies were established under the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964 to fight America's War on Poverty.

Revolving Loan Program Benefits Autism Center

The Section 108 Revolving Loan program, administered by Community Action Agency, is designed to help businesses start up or expand. In Oklahoma City, it was recently used to acquire property for Camelot, a residential treatment center that specializes in the treatment of autism.

Camelot of Oklahoma's residential treatment center is located on 10 acres and features tennis and basketball courts, a playground and wooded area. The 36-bed center provides autistic children with specialized therapy and one -on-one staffing, education and support to facilitate a successful return to family and community living.

The center has created over 60 new jobs.

Katrina Victim Aided

Special Projects Division of the Community Action Agency assisted a Hurricane Katrina victim purchase a house in 2007. The mobile home that she was living in went through the flood and she lost all of her belongings. She came to Oklahoma, got a job and was able to obtain a home through Habitat for Humanity and Community Action.

Turning Point

Ms. White, a single parent with one child, was admitted to Community Action's Turning Point Drug Court Program.

She has completed the 18-month program without receiving any court sanctions during the course of treatment.

Her daughter is making excellent grades in school. Ms. White is also enrolled in the agency's Home Buyer program.

Individual Development Account

Mr. Wood entered the program and began saving toward homeownership. By having a spending and savings plan, he and his wife were able to deposit an average of \$334 per month into their IDA for about six months. Once they began looking for a home, they realized how expensive it would be to own a nice home that was affordable. Therefore, they applied to have a Habitat for Humanity house built and were approved.

It was very exciting for the family to think about having a new home with no interest. The house was to originally be completed in early summer 2007 but record rainfalls significantly delayed the building process. In the fall, building continued with an expectation to close in early December. Despite the discouraging setback, Mr. Wood learned during that same time that he not only qualified for \$6,000 through the IDA program, but also qualified for another \$6,000 from our Special Projects Division. As the closing date approached, he was given notice that he would be receiving an additional \$10,000 from Habitat for Humanity. Thus, with all the assistance layered, it would bring his mortgage down from \$70,000 to \$51,000 at 0% interest.

But, another setback happened with the 2007 ice storm, which delayed the closing two weeks because of power outages and jeopardized \$16,000 of his anticipated assistance if he did not close by the end of the year. Finally, after working diligently with Habitat for Humanity, Community Action Agency and OG&E, the house received power, assistance checks were approved and Mr. Wood was able to close on his house on December 27, 2007.

Business Assistance

Mrs. Sorrells entered the program and saved about \$200 per month for 10 months in her IDA. During her time in the program she completed financial education, small business training and developed a viable business plan. She and her husband had been in the carpet restoration business on a part-time basis, but lacked the financial means to purchase the necessary equipment to enable them to competitively enter the market on a full-time basis or open a store where customers could shop for new carpet.

With assistance of the IDA program, she was able to open a small location in southeast Oklahoma City and purchase new equipment. The customer base began increasing immediately and within a few months, she was preparing to take on the business as a full-time job.

She reports the phone rings almost non-stop now. She and her husband are beginning to live their dream of having a successful carpet restoration and repair business.

Employment

A single father with one child was unemployed and lived in public housing. He received job referrals to several staffing agencies and secured part-time employment. After working about six weeks he was hired by the oil company. He has gone from \$7 per hour to over \$14 per hour. He is now in private housing and saving to buy a better car.

Helping People. Changing Lives.

An elderly man, referred by a local church, was seeking assistance with paying an electric bill.

He had multiple medical needs and took numerous medications. He received Medicare benefits but had no Part D (prescription) service. His medication expenses took most of his limited income.

His utility costs had seen a dramatic increase because his son, who had recently become disabled, along with his son's wife and their four school-age children had been forced to move in with him as they had no income. The son's wife had been unable to obtain work and was taking care of her husband as well as the client.

The Community Action Resource & Development staff along with other community partners obtained enough funds to pay the utility bill and aid this client with medication costs. They helped him enroll in Medicare Part D and submit an application for services with the Oklahoma Department of Human Services Advantage Program.

The Community Action staff obtained donations of food and clothing for the entire family, and toys for the children during the holidays.

The client is receiving all available benefits based on his financial and medical needs. The son and his family are receiving food stamps and other qualifying services, and the daughter-in-law is currently employed through the Advantage Program. She is receiving educational assistance through WorkForce Oklahoma.

A residential building lot in this family's community was recently donated to Community Action Resource & Development. The agency will be applying for funding to construct a single-family home for this family.

Linda lost her job due to a reduction in force. She was able to find a new job within 30 days but was on the verge of eviction because she had no income during her job search. CDSA was able to pay one month's rent, forestalling eviction and helping Linda to maintain self-sufficiency and care for her two young children.

Richard was unable to locate employment and wanted to move from a small town into Enid. CDSA provided temporary housing for him and assisted him in finding full-time employment in Enid. After receiving his first paycheck, Richard rented his own place where he still lives independently after one year.

Housing

Lorene lived in a home she had owned for many years but had been unable to repair. The bathroom was falling into the foundation, windows were broken, the roof leaked causing the kitchen ceiling to fall, and the heating system was barely operable. With help from CDSA through the HOME funded owner-occupied rehabilitation program, all repairs were made and Lorene now lives in a home that is safe, dry, and warm.

Housing Program Answers Prayers

When we met Mr. Gavit, he was living in a 500 sq. ft. house with many serious safety issues.

The heating system did not work and he used his kitchen stove and a small space heater to stay warm. The floors were rotting out and he worried every time he walked across them.

The bathroom was just barely big enough for a toilet, small tub and sink. The toilet rocked whenever it was used and Mr. Gavit prayed that he would not fall off or worse yet go through the floor.

The sewer line had collapsed and this man had dug it up himself and patched the broken area.

Mr. Gavit told us he didn't know how much longer he could continue to live in his house and had spent his time in the cold praying and believing that God would supply his needs. He was so excited the day we went to visit with him, he said we were the answer to his prayers. His house was replaced with a total electric, energy efficient, and handicap accessible 960 sq. ft. house.

Unfortunately, Mr. Gavit recently fell and suffered an injury that has made him live with his daughter during his recovery period.

His daughter called Delta recently and said he tells her all the time that his house is much better than hers as he can get around in it by himself and can't wait to get home.

We spoke to him and he just kept saying that the Lord answered his prayers in a way much more than he expected and he just can't wait to get home to his blessing.

Foster Grandparent Bridges Language Gap

Mary, a new Foster Grandparent, has been the key to communications between Head Start staff and the Hispanic families where she volunteers.

She also attends parent meetings as translator for the Hispanic parents.

Hi, my name is Ally. I'm 4 years old and I have Down Syndrome.

I would like to tell you a little bit about myself. I live with my dad and mom and my sister Abby and my grandma. Let me tell you about the great time I had at Head Start last year.

My teachers Miss Misty and Miss Cheryl taught me so much. I learned how to work on a computer and how to work in a group.

When I saw what the other kids were doing it made me want to be able to do it, too. I really didn't talk a lot at first but by the

end of the school year my vocabulary had many new words in it.

Miss Barbara always made us a healthy breakfast and lunch. I learned good hygiene, like washing my hands before I eat and after I go to the bathroom.

My teachers taught me how to clean up after myself, my mom and dad liked that I learned how to share, which is not my strongest point but I have gotten better.

Everything I learned at Head Start helped me get ready for Pre-K. So, I'm really glad I had the chance to go.

Utility Bill Paid

A single woman with a brain tumor and on a feeding tube was in jeopardy of getting her electricity turned off. With the help of her hospice nurse, Delta was able to provide funds to pay the electricity bill and prevent cut-off without this ill woman ever having to leave her home.

Delta Partners with Habitat for Humanity

Delta has partnered with Habitat for Humanity and received funding through a Priddy Foundation grant along with local donations to construct the first Habitat House in Stephens County.

Transit Provides Job Opportunity

In 2006 we began transporting a young lady from Johnston County to Murray College's MIT classes. That is a Department of Human Services program designed to assist TANF (Temporary Assistance for Needy Families) recipients learn skills that will assist them in securing employment.

During the next year INCA was able to assist her with clothing, food and non-emergency medical transportation.

While being transported twice a day through our JAMM TANF transportation program, the driver talked to her about applying for work at Dollar General Warehouse. She told her that if she got the job that we had a transit work route that could take her to and from the job. She was very excited about the opportunity since she did not have a vehicle of her own.

She got a job on the night shift and we continued to transport her through our road to work route. She worked hard to make a good employee. In just four months she advanced at work, got the opportunity to work the day shift which was much more suitable for her children and became a trainer. Today she is making \$14.50 an hour, has health insurance and obtained her own car.

Community Specialist Helps Family

A couple came into the INCA Family and Community Service Office in Sulphur. They were down on their luck, had no money, their car was broken down, the husband was unemployed and the wife was only working about 18 hours a week.

INCA's community specialist assisted the family with a food basket, referred them to a local church that assisted with their utilities and connected them to an individual that helped get their car up and running.

While at the church the husband was given a business card of someone that was looking for help. He did not hesitate and went right away to check on the job.

A couple of months later the community specialist followed up and they told her that the job was not the best job to get, however, it lead him to a great job. They said they were on their way to getting back on their feet.

They wanted her to know how much they had appreciated what INCA had done for them. The Community Specialist said they hugged and thank her



Conferences & Training

On-going training is provided to professional staff, volunteer board members and Head Start parents during conferences. Technical information, best practices, and management skills are shared through peer-to-peer sessions and by experts from governmental agencies and private organizations. Training tracks are provided for staff members of the various programs over the course of the year. During the annual conference held in the fall, the Oklahoma Association of Community Action Agencies (OKACAA) recognizes agency staff members and volunteers for their dedication to helping low-income families become self-sufficient. During 2007, about 775 persons attended the conferences.

OKACAA, under contract with the Oklahoma Department of Commerce, provides experts to visit Head Start programs to assist with program self-assessments and provide one-on-one technical assistance to help the programs prepare for their federal reviews. This program is funded by an appropriation from the Oklahoma Legislature. Technical assistance was provided to eight agencies during 2007. Oklahoma is unique in providing this assistance to its state Head Start grantees.

OKACAA staff also provides technical assistance and information to Oklahoma's Head Start programs through monthly meetings with program directors, distribution of information and discussion of current issues through an internet-based information system.

Head Start Collaboration

The mission of the Oklahoma Head Start State Collaboration Project is to support efforts to build early childhood systems and access to comprehensive services for low-income children, and to encourage widespread collaborations between community-based Head Start programs and state early childhood initiatives and policies. The project supports collaborations in eight priority areas. The following are examples of positive results in 2007:

- Improving access to health care services by distributing 20,000 copies of the "Strong and Healthy Oklahoma" guidebook, primarily through Head Start programs, that suggests simple ways to make healthy choices in eating, exercise, and tobacco cessation, plus lists county, state, and national resources.
- Improving collaborations with family support systems by working with the Oklahoma Marriage Initiative to disseminate training information on relationships/marriage, fatherhood, and family formation to Head Start programs and their partners.
- Improving availability, accessibility, and quality of childcare by working with the Oklahoma Partnership for School Readiness as a member of the Ready Schools and Collaboration Action Teams of the Early Childhood Comprehensive Systems Plan to ensure schools are ready for young children when they enter school, and to promote collaborative systems development.
- Expanding and improving opportunities in early childhood programs by participation in the workgroup developing the Core Competencies for Early Childhood Professionals with a goal of completing this work by the end of April 2008.
- Improving collaborations among community partners by Hosting and chairing two meetings of the Head Start State Collaboration Office Advisory Board to provide updates on Head Start and the Head Start State Collaboration Office, and to receive updates from state level partner members.
- Improving access to family literacy services by working with WGBH, Boston Public Television; the Oklahoma Indian Head Start Directors Association; and the University of Oklahoma Center for Early

Childhood Development to initiate the development of a literacy curriculum for American Indian Head Start programs and other Head Start and early childhood programs.

 Improving opportunities for children with disabilities by hosting and chairing a meeting to finalize the Oklahoma Disabilities Memorandum of Understanding/Interagency Agreement with the State Department of Education IDEA Parts B and C staff; 3 Region VI ACF staff members and the Head Start Disabilities TA Specialist for Oklahoma; Head Start local program disabilities coordinator; State Department of Health Early Intervention coordinator; and the Oklahoma Commission on Children and Youth Interagency Coordinating Council Coordinator.

Homebuyer Education

The Oklahoma Homebuyer Education Association (OHEA) offers training and technical assistance to agencies preparing working class families for homeownership. Through 2007 OHEA has certified 305 homebuyer education professionals (CHEPs) of which 160 are currently active in Oklahoma. The association also partners with other agencies through the Oklahoma Jump\$tart Coalition to encourage general financial literacy for youth and adults.

OHEA supports the Oklahoma Weatherization and Housing Advisory Council by providing a track on homeownership and financial literacy at their annual State Housing and Energy Conference. The association held its Annual Membership Meeting in conjunction with OWHAC in 2007. OHEA saves Oklahoma agencies more than \$800 per staff member over the cost of using a national provider. OHEA also has distributed over \$48,000 in subsidies to agencies providing homebuyer education in rural areas.

OHEA continues to provide a unique network for supporting the development of new Oklahoma homeowners thanks to the support of OKACAA and the Federal Home Loan Bank of Topeka.

Community action agency service providers and their partners have reported assisting 1356 low- and moderate-income Oklahomans with their home purchases. Over 12,000 Oklahomans have attended OHEA certified homebuyer education workshops in preparation for ownership.

Oklahoma Asset Development Project

The Oklahoma Asset Development Project completed a three-year effort to help those benefiting from free tax preparation sites to develop asset development strategies and increase financial skills. The final year saw a continued increase in the number of returns prepared (from 9,700 to 11,000) and the EITC and Child Tax Credits returned to Oklahomans (from \$11,000,000 to over \$18,000,000).

Over the term of the grant:

- 1. 1,254 tax clients inquired about financial literacy/asset development
- 2. 1,863 tax clients received financial literacy/asset development counseling from the community action agency providing tax services
- 3. 282 tax clients received homebuyer education from the community action agency providing tax services
- 4. 56 tax clients were involved in an IDA or other asset building program with the community action agency providing tax services
- 5. 742 tax clients were referred to partners for financial counseling
- 6. 36 tax clients were referred to other agencies for homebuyer education
- 7. 668 tax clients were referred to partners for financial literacy programming
- 8. 1,579 tax clients were referred to other assistance programs offered through the community action agency providing tax services

Although Office of Community Services funds are no longer available for the asset development side of the project, the Oklahoma Department of Commerce has stepped up and agreed to provide funding through OKACAA for the agencies to continue to offer free tax preparation in the 2008. This will spare the neediest Oklahomans from paying to receive the refunds and tax credits that are due to them and bring an estimated \$20 million into the state's economy.

Poverty Awareness

OKACAA continued its effort to familiarize policy makers and others of efforts by the Community Action network to help low-income families move toward self-sufficiency. The association distributed its annual report and directory that featured statistical information about agency programs along with key contacts and service locations. The publication is a resource for policy makers, state and federal agency officials, allied organizations and others who serve the low-income population.

OKACAA sponsored a legislative conference to help educate legislators on how policy and funding decisions impact Oklahoma's low-income residents. The conference provided opportunities for discussions of issues impacting the clients served by the Community Action network.

Community Action Solutions, the association's bimonthly newsletter, featured articles on a variety of programs conducted by agencies. The newsletter is distributed electronically through the Internet.

OKACAA staff helped facilitate Poverty Simulations in Ada, Ardmore and Shawnee. The simulations are an interactive workshop designed to help participants experience the daily realities of people living in poverty. Participants assume the roles of different families facing poverty and must interact with community resources to provide for basic necessities and shelter during the simulation.

A typical comment from a participant: "This was a surprise. I live in a comfortable setting and I've never had to face something like this. I don't think I could do it in real life. It's stressful having problems making ends meet."

Weatherization

OKACAA administers the Oklahoma Weatherization and Housing Advisory Council (OWHAC) which is composed of representatives from the housing and weatherization programs operated by member agencies. OWHAC's mission is to provide technical assistance and training and to promote safe, decent, affordable and comfortable housing throughout the state. OWHAC annually sponsors the Oklahoma Housing and Energy Conference that provide training on technical issues and current information on federal and state programs and regulations.

Two community action agencies weatherized seven homes of senior citizens using funds provided by OG&E through a partnership with OKACAA.
